

Curriculum Offerings

All the Learning Areas of the National Curriculum are offered. A good selection of WACE courses (examinable and non-examinable) are offered to Years 11 and 12 students, as well as VET courses. In addition to meeting the requirements of the Department of Education Services and the Curriculum Standards and Reporting Authority, Langford Islamic College offers Islamic Studies to cater for the religious/spiritual needs and development of students. The Islamic Studies curriculum is enriched with core shared values. Values and character education/citizenship are very important aspects of the Islamic Studies Curriculum offered at Langford Islamic College.

The National Curriculum is being implemented in all learning areas across the school.

The Early Years Learning Framework is being implemented in Kindergarten – Year 2, under the watchful eyes of Mrs N Jumali whose responsibility is the coordinating the implementation of this. Quality Improvement Plan: The National Regulations require schools to have a Quality Improvement Plan (QIP). The aim of the plan is to assist schools self-assess their performance in delivering quality education and care and to plan future improvements. Visual Arts: The College places high importance on nurturing students' creative minds and creativity. The Visual Arts Centre and the resources purchased have also made a significant difference in students' learning and enjoyment of the subject.

In 2016, we demonstrated significant improvement in general student performance across all years. This year saw the launch of the more customised transition program for our Year 6 students.


The following events were held in order to encourage more parent involvement in their child's education:
