



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

historical contexts to grasp the enormity and profundity of this tragic chapter of Australian history. Harmony Week's incursion of the Aboriginal presenter, Mr Russell Dawson ('Uncle Russel'), proved to be an excellent springboard for their learning of the Indigenous language, culture and tradition. Students created very thoughtful collages to represent their learning of the topic. This helped them understand how discrimination and racism can have long-lasting effects on vulnerable communities. They also learnt that the purpose of their education is to use their sense of social justice and stand up for the rights of the minorities.


Creative Writing Time in Pre-primary Green


